Some disruption to regular park users occurs where races cross footpaths; marshals cover all footpath crossing points. Cobnar Road pavilion is where all races start and finish.

### Footpaths Around the Dams

The footpath located between the animal paddock and the bottom dam has been resurfaced with limestone which has made a vast improvement. The path alongside the dam is to be resurfaced during 2010 with tarmac.

The boundaries have been confirmed and the owner has been given a time limit by which the wall must be built and the historic wall must be restored, if he wishes to purchase the land to the north for access to his garage. fter 10 years of problems associated with defining the boundary of Chantry Cottage and numerous meetings with SCC Parks and Countryside, Legal & Admin and Councillors, Friends of Graves Park are able to say an agreement has been reached with the owner, resulting from which a stone wall will be constructed on the western boundary between the Norton Nursery site and the cottage boundary. The historical brick wall which formed the containment of the walled nursery garden to Norton Hall is to be reconstructed where it has been demolished, by the owner of the

cottage. Once the works are achieved to the satisfaction of SCC and Friends of Graves Park, it is planned to plant a replacement Gingko Biloba tree as close to the position of the previous tree, which was wantonly removed by the owner of the cottage during his development

igns of spring have been late in arriving this year due to the most prolonged winter in a generation. The temperature fell as low as -6°C and didn't rise above 7°C in the first two months of 2010. One of the first flowers to appear was the cowslip – now with nearly 470 flowering plants across the meadow and border areas, this is an encouraging start to spring 2010.

Past years' growth in the central meadow was mown in February, a

little delayed from the practice over the last few years due to the vast amount of lying snow. Already this spring considerable pruning and clearing of undergrowth has been carried out to improve the border areas and increase the biodiversity. Additionally, a new covering of bark chippings has been made to continue to define and develop the shrub islands at either end of the meadow and around the information base area. branches on Overhanging

trees around the pond were

pruned back and the undergrowth is slowly being cleared as appropriate. The work carried out has been supported by the Sheffield Rangers who will continue to work with us on selected days throughout the year.

n March the pond was treated with Excalibur, a decomposed extract of barley straw, to see how effective it is on controlling the blanket weed that had been so abundant last year. In early April, a pair of Mallard took temporary residence and actively fed in the pond. Hundreds of frogspawn and, for the first time, thousands of toadspawn were noted in the pond proof that the wildlife in the area is benefiting from our efforts.

irds of note included a large flock of redwing during the cold spell in January and a kestrel, seen hunting in the area on several occasions in the early months. The area has two singing blackcap and a willow warbler this spring



along with the more usual finches, robins, dunnocks and wrens. Insect life has been slow to emerge but the first butterflies and bees were starting to move through the area in April.
